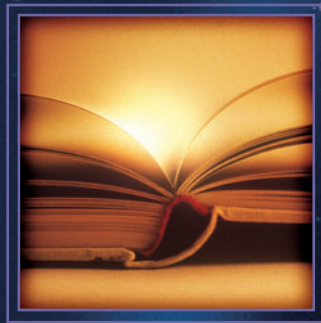

The most effective way to this is through the inductive approach. The inductive approach means that you begin with the Word of God itself. In fact, if you want to satisfy your hunger and thirst to know God and His Word in a deeper way, you must do more than merely read Scripture and study what someone else has said about it. Just as no one else can eat and digest your food for you, so no one else can feed on God’s Word for you. You must interact with the text yourself, absorbing its truths and letting God engrave His truth on your heart and mind and life.

That is the very heart of inductive study: seeing truth for yourself, discerning what it means, and applying that truth to your life. In His inspired Word, God has given us everything we need to know about life and godliness. But He doesn’t stop there. He gives every believer a resident teacher—the Holy Spirit—who guides us into His truth.

The Bible is unlike any other book. It is supernatural. It is complete in itself. The Bible needs no other books or truths to supplement it. In inductive study the Bible becomes its own commentary, and it can be understood by any believer.

Anyone who will take the time can see and understand what God has given us in His Word and how it applies to us today.

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HOW TO USE THE INDUCTIVE STUDY APPROACH



If you know there is more to the Word of God than you have discovered so far...

- ☞ If you sense there must be concrete answers to the complexities of life...

God's eternal, infallible Word is your guidebook for all of life, and inductive study gives you the key to understanding that guide.

Inductive study, a method that brings you directly to the Word of God apart from another's understanding or interpretation of the text, involves three skills: *observation*, *interpretation*, and *application*.

OBSERVATION

Discover What It Says!

Observation teaches you to see precisely what the passage says. It is the basis for accurate interpretation and correct application. Observation answers the question: What does the passage say?

INTERPRETATION

Discover What It Means!

Interpretation answers the question: What does the passage mean?

APPLICATION

Discover How It Works!

Application answers the question: What does it mean to me personally? What truths can I put into practice? What changes

should I make in my life?

When you know what God says, what He means, and how to put His truths into practice, you will be equipped for every circumstance of life. Ultimately, the goal of personal Bible study is a transformed life and a deep and abiding relationship with Jesus Christ.

The following ten steps provide the basis for inductive study. As you take these steps, observation, interpretation, and application will sometimes happen simultaneously. God can give you insight at any point in your study, so be sensitive to His leading. When words or passages make an impression on you, stop for a moment and meditate on what God has shown you. Record your personal notes and insights in the margin so that you can remember what you've learned.

One of the most valuable aspects of the *NISB* is its wide-margin format, which has been specifically designed to enable you to easily keep a record of what God personally reveals to you from His Word. Although some are hesitant to mark in their Bibles, this interactive Bible has been designed with marking in mind. God wants you to know, understand, and remember His Word, and one of the most profitable ways to do this is to interact with the text through marking and writing.

As you study the Bible chapter by chapter and book by book, you will grow in your ability to comprehend the whole counsel of God. In the future, you will be able to refer to your notes again and again as you study portions of Scripture and grow in your knowledge of Him.

Just before God commissioned Amos and Hosea as prophets to the northern kingdom to warn Israel of the impending invasion by the Assyrians, He appointed the prophet Jonah to go to Nineveh, the capital of Assyria. Yet fifty years later, in 722 B.C., Assyria would take the last portion of the northern kingdom into captivity.

God knew what Assyria would do. Why, then, did He bother to send Jonah to the wicked city of Nineveh? Because of who God is. The focus of Jonah is not a man trapped in the belly of a great fish; the focus is people engraved on the heart of God.

THINGS TO DO (*If you have not done so, read the section titled Observation on pages NISB-17 to NISB-24.*)

1. Before you read through Jonah, look up 2 Kings 14:23-27, which mentions Jonah and his ministry during the reign of Jeroboam II, son of Joash, king of Israel. At that time Shalmaneser IV was king of Assyria.
2. In a distinctive way mark the key words listed on the JONAH AT A GLANCE chart on page 8. Double-underline in green every geographical reference. Mark all references to time with a clock .
3. What you learn about God in this book is awesome. As you mark the references to Him, you might want to put a triangle in the margin of the text noting what God does.
4. Record the theme of each chapter on JONAH AT A GLANCE and in the text next to the chapter number. Then fill in the rest of the chart.

THINGS TO THINK ABOUT

1. What or who evokes compassion in your heart? Contrast Jonah's heart with God's heart. How does your heart compare with God's? Does it long for the same things? Why?
2. Is there something that you know God wants you to do that you haven't done? What can you learn from Jonah's life?
3. How did Jesus view the story of Jonah? Read Matthew 12:39-41; 16:4. Will you accept as truth what Jesus accepted as fact—or did Jesus compare His resurrection to a mythological tale?

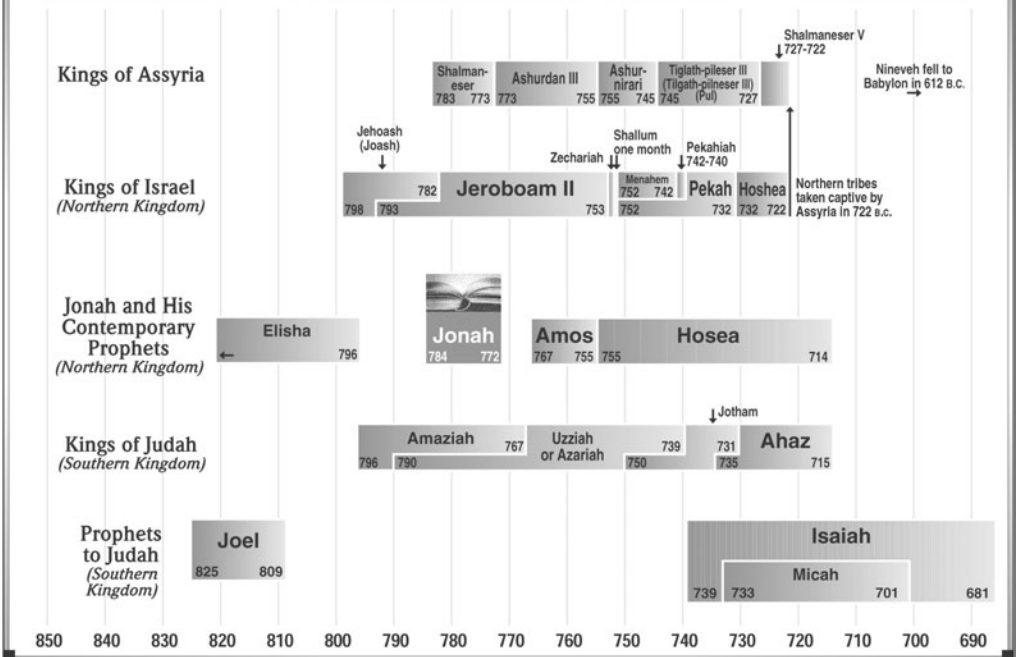

3 Now the word of the LORD came to Jonah the second time, saying,

2 “Arise, go to ^aNineveh the great city and ^bproclaim to it the proclamation which I am going to tell you.”

3 So Jonah arose and went to Nineveh according to the word of the LORD. Now Nineveh was ¹an ^aexceedingly great city, a three days’ walk.

4 Then Jonah began to go through the city one day’s walk; and he ^acried out and said, “Yet forty days and Nineveh will be overthrown.”

5 Then the people of Nineveh believed in God; and they called a ^afast and put on sackcloth from the greatest to the least of them.

6 When the word reached the king of Nineveh, he arose from his throne, laid aside his robe from him, ^acovered *himself* with sackcloth and sat on the ¹ashes.

7 He issued a ^aproclamation and it said, “In Nineveh by the decree of the king and his nobles: Do not let man, beast, herd, or flock taste a thing. Do not let them eat or drink water.

8 “But both man and beast must be covered with sackcloth; and let ¹men ^acall on God earnestly that each may ^bturn from his wicked way and from the violence which is in ²his hands.

9 “Who knows, God may turn and relent and withdraw His burning anger so that we will not perish.”

10 When God saw their deeds, that they ^aturned from their wicked way, then ^bGod relented concerning the calamity which He had declared He would ¹bring upon them. And He did not do *it*.

Chapter 4 Theme

4 But it greatly displeased Jonah and he became ^aangry.

2 He ^aprayed to the LORD and said, “Please LORD, was not this ¹what I said while I was still in my *own* country? Therefore ²in order to forestall this I ^bfled to Tarshish, for I knew that You are a ^cgracious and compassionate God, slow to anger and abundant in lovingkindness, and one who relents concerning calamity.

3 “Therefore now, O LORD, please ^atake my ¹life from me, for death is ^bbetter to me than life.”

4 The LORD said, “Do you have good reason to be angry?”

5 Then Jonah went out from the city and sat east of ¹it. There he made a shelter for himself and ^asat under it in the shade until he could see what would happen in the city.

6 So the LORD God appointed a ¹plant and it grew up over Jonah to be a shade over his head to deliver him from his discomfort. And Jonah was ²extremely happy about the ¹plant.

Because they had not obeyed the word of the Lord, in 586 B.C. the children of Israel were taken into captivity. The nation that was once the head became the tail, just as God had spoken through His prophet Moses. And just as God had decreed through Jeremiah the prophet, the children of Israel's captivity lasted for 70 years.

In 538 B.C. Cyrus, the king of Persia, issued a decree allowing the children of Israel to return to Jerusalem and rebuild their temple. It was just as God had said when Isaiah prophesied 150 years earlier. In 516 B.C. Zerubbabel finished the temple, just as God promised. In 445 B.C. the Persian King Artaxerxes permitted Nehemiah to return to Jerusalem and rebuild its walls, just as Daniel had prophesied.

Over and over, the children of Israel saw that God stood by His word. Just as Solomon wrote in Proverbs, the hearts of kings were in God's hands and He could turn them wherever He wanted. Why, then, did the remnant of Israel think that they could live and worship any way they wanted once they returned from their 70 years of exile and settled again in Israel? Had they grown tired of waiting for the fulfillment of the prophecies which promised that the Messiah would reign as King over all the earth? Had God abandoned them as He had Esau's descendants? Did they think He would allow the heathen nations who had come against them to go unpunished? Or were they entertaining thoughts that God really did not love them, that He would not keep His covenant promises?

Whatever it was, once again the remnant became apathetic in their relationship with God. So He spoke one more time through Malachi, whose name means "my messenger." It was sometime around 433 B.C. and then came a famine for hearing the Word of the Lord (Amos 8:11)

THINGS TO DO (*If you have not done so, read the section titled Observation on pages NISB-17 to NISB-24.*)

1. Since Malachi is a short book, read it without interruption so you can get a perspective of the book as a whole before you observe it chapter by chapter. As you read, catch the atmosphere of this book. Remember, this was written to people who had been sent into exile because of disobedience and then had returned to their land, just as God had promised.
2. Now read through Malachi one chapter at a time, doing the following:
 - a. In a distinctive way or color mark the key words listed on the MALACHI AT A GLANCE chart on page 15. Write these key words on an index card you can use as a bookmark while you study Malachi.
 - b. As you mark every reference to *you say* or *said*, watch what the priests and/or the people say and how God answers.
 - c. You may want to note in the margin with whom God is upset, why He is upset, and what He tells them to do or what He is going to do as a result.
 - d. Observe what will happen to those who fear His name and to those who do not.
 - e. Note God's call to return to Him, how they are to return, and what will happen if they do.
3. When you finish each chapter, decide what the main subject or theme of that chapter is and record it on MALACHI AT A GLANCE and next to the chapter number in the text.
4. As you read the final chapter of Malachi, read Deuteronomy 28–30, which speaks of the blessings or curses upon those who obey or disobey the law given by Moses.

- God was silent for 400 years after He spoke through His prophet Malachi. His silence was broken when an angel appeared to Zacharias with the news that he and Elizabeth would give birth to a son. Read Luke 1:5-17 and Matthew 11:2-15, and see how these passages relate to God’s final promise in Malachi. Record the essence of that promise in the margin of Malachi 4, and write next to it the cross-references in Luke and Matthew.
- Create a four-column chart called THE DAY OF THE LORD and record on it what you learn from Malachi about that day. Note the reference (book, chapter, and verse); how the day is described; what happens in nature; and signs of the beginning or end.

THINGS TO THINK ABOUT

- What do you learn from God’s word to the priests that you can apply to your own life? Read through the list you compiled on “the priests” and remember that if you belong to the Lord Jesus Christ, you are part of a kingdom of priests unto God. What kind of a priest are you? In principle, do you think God expects anything less of you as a Christian? For instance, what do you offer the Lord of your time and talents, your tithe and offering? Do you give others instructions according to the Word of the Lord or according to the current philosophy of the world? What about your covenant relationship with your mate?
- Are you tired of serving God? Or do you fear Him? If so, what is God’s promise to you?



Chapter 1 Theme

1 The ^{1a}oracle of the word of the LORD to ^bIsrael through ²Malachi.

2 “I have ^aloved you,” says the LORD. But you say, “How have You loved us?” “Was not Esau Jacob’s brother?” declares the LORD. “Yet I ^bhave loved Jacob;

3 but I have hated Esau, and I have ^amade his mountains a desolation and *appointed* his inheritance for the jackals of the wilderness.”

4 Though Edom says, “We have been ^abeaten down, but we will ^breturn and build up the ruins”; thus says the LORD of hosts, “They may ^cbuild, but I will tear down; and *men* will call them the ²wicked territory, and the people ³toward whom the LORD is indignant ^dforever.”

5 Your eyes will see this and you will say, “^aThe LORD ¹be magnified beyond the ²border of Israel!”

6 “A son ^ahonors *his* father, and a servant his master. Then if I am a ^bfather, where is My honor? And if I am a master, where is My ¹respect?” says the LORD of hosts to you, O ^cpriests who despise My name. But you say, ‘How have we despised Your name?’

7 “*You* are presenting ^adefiled ^{1b}food upon My altar. But you say, ‘How have we defiled You?’ In that you say, ‘The ^ctable of the LORD is to be despised.’

8 “But when you present the ^ablind for sacrifice, is it not evil? And when you present the lame and sick, is it not evil? ¹Why not offer it to your ^bgovernor? Would he be pleased with you? Or would he receive you kindly?” says the LORD of hosts.

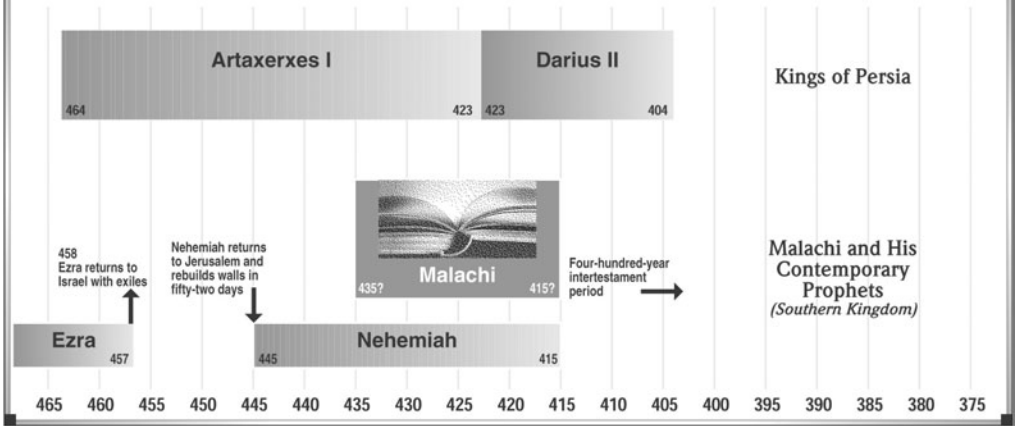

¹⁰ “Oh that there were one among you who would ^ashut the ¹gates, that you might not uselessly kindle *fire on My altar!* I am not pleased with you,” says the LORD of hosts, “^bnor will I accept an offering from ²you.

¹¹ “For from the ^arising of the sun even to its setting, ^bMy name *will be* ^cgreat among the nations, and in every place ^dincense is going to be offered to My name, and a grain offering *that is* pure; for My name *will be* ^egreat among the nations,” says the LORD of hosts.

¹² “But you are ^aprofaning it, in that you say, ‘The table of the LORD is defiled, and as for its fruit, its food is to be despised.’

¹³ “You also say, ¹‘My, how ^atiresome it is!’ And you disdainfully sniff at it,” says the LORD of hosts, “and you bring what was taken by ^brobbery and *what is* ^clame or sick; so you bring the offering! Should I ^dreceive that from your hand?” says the LORD.

¹⁴ “But cursed be the ^aswindler who has a male in his flock and vows it, but sacrifices a ^bblemished animal to the Lord, for I am a great ^cKing,” says the LORD of hosts, “and My name is ^dfeared among the ²nations.”

2 “And now this commandment is for you, O priests.

² “If you do ^anot listen, and if you do not take it to heart to give honor to My name,” says the LORD of hosts, “then I will send the ^bcurse upon you and I will curse your blessings; and indeed, I have ^ccursed them *already*, because you are not taking it to heart.

³ “Behold, I am going to ^arebuke your ¹offspring, and I will

^bspread ²refuse on your faces, the ²refuse of your ^cfeasts; and you will be taken away ³with it.

4 “Then you will know that I have sent this commandment to you, ¹that My ^acovenant may ²continue with Levi,” says the LORD of hosts.

5 “My covenant with him was *one of* life and ^apeace, and I gave them to him *as an object of* ¹reverence; so he ^{2b}revered Me and stood in awe of My name.

6 ^{1a}True instruction was in his mouth and unrighteousness was not found on his lips; he walked ^bwith Me in peace and uprightness, and he ^cturned many back from iniquity.

7 “For the lips of a priest should preserve ^aknowledge, and ¹men should ^bseek ²instruction from his mouth; for he is the ^cmessenger of the LORD of hosts.

8 “But as for you, you have turned aside from the way; you have caused many to ^astumble ¹by the instruction; you have ^{2b}corrupted the covenant of Levi,” says the LORD of hosts.

9 “So ^aI also have made you despised and ^babased ¹before all the people, just as you are not keeping My ways but are showing ^cpartiality in the ²instruction.

10 “Do we not all have ^aone father? ^bHas not one God created us? Why do we deal ^ctreacherously each against his brother so as to profane the ^dcovenant of our fathers?

11 “Judah has dealt ^atreacherously, and an abomination has been committed in Israel and in Jerusalem; for Judah has ^bprofaned the sanctuary of the LORD ¹which He loves and has married the daughter of a foreign god.

12 “As for the man who does this, may the ^aLORD cut off from the tents of Jacob *everyone* who awakes and answers, or who ^bpresents ¹an offering to the LORD of hosts.

13 “This is ¹another thing you do: you cover the altar of the LORD with tears, with weeping and with groaning, because He ^ano longer regards the ²offering or accepts *it with* favor from your hand.

14 “Yet you say, ‘For what reason?’ Because the LORD has been a witness between you and the ^awife of your youth, against whom you have dealt ^btreacherously, though she is your companion and your wife by covenant.

15 ¹But not one has ^adone so who has a remnant of the Spirit. And ²what did *that one do* while he was seeking a ^bgodly ³offspring? Take heed then to your spirit, and let no one deal ^ctreacherously against the wife of your youth.

16 “For ¹I hate ^{2a}divorce,” says the LORD, the God of Israel, “and ³him who covers his garment with ^{4b}wrong,” says the LORD of hosts. “So take heed to your spirit, that you do not deal treacherously.”

17 You have ^awearied the LORD with your words. Yet you say, “How have we wearied *Him*?” In that you say, “^bEveryone who does evil is good in the sight of the LORD, and He ^cdelights in them,” or, “^dWhere is the God of ^ejustice?”

3 ^aBehold, I am going to send ^bMy ¹messenger, and he will ^{2c}clear the way before Me. And the Lord, whom you seek, will suddenly come to His temple; ³and the ^{1d}messenger of the covenant, in whom you delight, behold, He is coming," says the LORD of hosts.

2 "But who can ^aendure the day of His coming? And who can stand when He appears? For He is like a ^brefiner's fire and like ¹fullers' soap.

3 "He will sit as a smelter and purifier of silver, and He will ^apurify the sons of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, so that they may ^bpresent to the LORD ¹offerings in righteousness.

4 "Then the ¹offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be ^apleasing to the LORD as in the ^bdays of old and as in former years.

5 "Then I will draw near to you for judgment; and I will be a swift witness against the ^asorcerers and against the ^badulterers and against those who ^cswear falsely, and against those who oppress the ^dwage earner in his wages, the ^ewidow and the ¹orphan, and those who turn aside the ^{2f}alien and do not ³fear Me," says the LORD of hosts.

6 "For ¹I, the LORD, ^ado not change; therefore you, O sons of Jacob, ²are not consumed.

7 "From the ^adays of your fathers you have turned aside from My statutes and have not kept *them*. ^bReturn to Me, and I will return to you," says the LORD of hosts. "But you say, 'How shall we return?'

8 "Will a man ¹rob God? Yet you are robbing Me! But you say, 'How have we robbed You?' In ^atithes and ²offerings.

9 "You are ^acursed with a curse, for you are ¹robbing Me, the whole nation *of you!*

10 ^a"Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, so that there may be ¹food in My house, and test Me now in this," says the LORD of hosts, "if I will not ^bopen for you the windows of heaven and ^cpour out for you a blessing until ^{2d}it overflows.

11 "Then I will rebuke the ^adevourer for you, so that it will not ¹destroy the fruits of the ground; nor will your vine in the field cast *its grapes*," says the LORD of hosts.

12 ^a"All the nations will call you blessed, for you shall be a ^bdelightful land," says the LORD of hosts.

13 "Your words have been ¹arrogant against Me," says the LORD. "Yet you say, 'What have we spoken against You?'

14 "You have said, 'It is ^avain to serve God; and what ^bprofit is it that we have kept His charge, and that we have walked in mourning before the LORD of hosts?'

15 'So now we ^acall the arrogant blessed; not only are the doers of wickedness built up but they also test God and ^bescape.'"

16 Then those who ¹feared the LORD spoke to one another, and the LORD ^agave attention and heard *it*, and a ^bbook of remembrance was written before Him for those who ¹fear the LORD and who esteem His name.

17 “They will be ^aMine,” says the LORD of hosts, “on the ^bday that I ¹prepare My ^{2c}own possession, and I will ³spare them as a man ^{3d}sparcs his own son who serves him.”

18 So you will again ^adistinguish between the righteous and the wicked, between one who serves God and one who does not serve Him.

2 PETER

A fisherman by trade, Peter had been captured and transformed by the Great Shepherd. Is it any wonder that even in Peter's darkest hour, the welfare of God's sheep was uppermost in his mind?

Ever since the day he stood with Jesus by a fire, the morning air full of the aroma of roasting fish, Peter had known the way he would die. But Peter would be faithful. His concern about his death and the way he would die would not override his concern for the sheep Jesus had commissioned him to feed and shepherd. And so, sometime around A.D. 63 or 64, Peter writes "to those who have received a faith of the same kind as ours."

In A.D. 64, according to tradition, Peter was crucified upside down for the Lord he once denied knowing. How Peter had grown in the grace and knowledge of his God!

THINGS TO DO (*If you have not done so, read the section titled Observation on pages NISB-17 to NISB-24.*)

1. Read 2 Peter, marking every reference to the author in a distinctive color, and every reference to the recipients in another color. Then on the OBSERVATIONS CHART on page 21 note everything you learn about each. Observe what the author says about himself. When in his life is he writing? Who are the recipients? How are they described? Why is he writing?
2. In a distinctive way, mark in the text the key words (and their synonyms and pronouns) listed on the 2 PETER AT A GLANCE chart on page 22. Then list on a piece of paper the truths you learn by marking these key words. Be thorough, because the lists will help you see the flow of the book.
3. Read through 2 Peter again and look for specific instructions that Peter gives the readers concerning their behavior and belief. Record these on the OBSERVATIONS CHART under "Instructions." Also look for and note any people or groups of people of which Peter warns them to beware.
4. In this book, Peter states specifically why he is writing. Look for and underline any verse in which Peter says, "*I am writing to you.*" Also, underline any other verses that indicate his purpose in writing. Record his purpose for writing on 2 PETER AT A GLANCE.
5. Summarize the message of each paragraph and record its theme on 2 PETER AT A GLANCE. Then determine the chapter themes and the book theme and record these in the appropriate places on the chart and in the text.
6. Mark every reference to God (and Lord, if it refers to the Father). Then list what you learn about God from this short but much-needed epistle.
7. Create a four-column chart called THE DAY OF THE LORD and record on it what you learn from 2 Peter about that day. Note the reference (book, chapter, and verse); how the day is described; what happens in nature; and signs of the beginning or end.

Chapter 1 Theme

1 ¹Simon Peter, a ^abond-servant and ^bapostle of Jesus Christ, ¹To those who have received ^ca faith of the same ²kind as ours, ³by ^athe righteousness of ^eour God and Savior, Jesus Christ:

2 ^aGrace and peace be multiplied to you in ^bthe knowledge of God and of Jesus our Lord;

3 seeing that His ^adivine power has granted to us everything pertaining to life and godliness, through the true ^bknowledge of Him who ^ccalled us ¹by His own glory and ²excellence.

4 ¹For by these He has granted to us His precious and magnificent ^apromises, so that by them you may become ^bpartakers of *the* divine nature, having ^cescaped the ^acorruption that is in ^ethe world by lust.

5 Now for this very reason also, applying all diligence, in your faith ^asupply ^bmoral ¹excellence, and in *your* moral excellence, ^cknowledge,

6 and in *your* knowledge, ^aself-control, and in *your* self-control, ^bperseverance, and in *your* perseverance, ^cgodliness,

7 and in *your* godliness, ^abrotherly kindness, and in *your* brotherly kindness, love.

8 For if these *qualities* are yours and are increasing, they render you neither useless nor ^aunfruitful in the true ^bknowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ.

9 For he who lacks these *qualities* is ^ablind or short-sighted, having forgotten *his* ^bpurification from his former sins.

10 Therefore, brethren, be all the more diligent to make certain about His ^acalling and ^bchoosing you; for as long as you practice these things, you will never ^cstumble;

11 for in this way the entrance into ^athe eternal kingdom of our ^bLord and Savior Jesus Christ will be ^cabundantly ^asupplied to you.

12 Therefore, ^{a1}I will always be ready to remind you of these things, even though you *already* know *them*, and have been established in ^bthe truth which is present with *you*.

13 I consider it ^aright, as long as I am in ^bthis *earthly* dwelling, to ^cstir you up by way of reminder,

14 knowing that ^athe laying aside of my *earthly* dwelling is imminent, ^bas also our Lord Jesus Christ has made clear to me.

15 And I will also be diligent that at any time after my ^adeparture you will be able to call these things to mind.

16 For we did not follow cleverly devised ^atales when we made known to you the ^bpower and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we were ^ceyewitnesses of His majesty.

17 For when He received honor and glory from God the Father, such an ¹utterance as this was ²made to Him by the ^bMajestic Glory, "This is My beloved Son with whom I am well-pleased"—

18 and we ourselves heard this ¹utterance made from heaven when we were with Him on the ^aholy mountain.

19 ¹So we have ^athe prophetic word *made* more ^bsure, to which you do well to pay attention as to ^ca lamp shining in a dark place, until the ^aday dawns and the ^emorning star arises ^fin your hearts.

20 But ^aknow this first of all, that ^bno prophecy of Scripture is a *matter* of one's own interpretation,
 21 for ^ano prophecy was ever made by an act of human will, but men ^bmoved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God.

2 But ^afalse prophets also arose among the people, just as there will also be ^bfalse teachers ^camong you, who will ^dsecretly introduce ^edestructive heresies, even ^fdenying the ^gMaster who ^hbought them, bringing swift destruction upon themselves.

2 Many will follow their ^asensuality, and because of them ^bthe way of the truth will be ^cmaligned;

3 and in *their* ^agreed they will ^bexploit you with ^cfalse words; ^dtheir judgment from long ago is not idle, and their destruction is not asleep.

4 For ^aif God did not spare angels when they sinned, but cast them into hell and ^bcommitted them to pits of darkness, reserved for judgment;

5 and did not spare ^athe ancient world, but preserved ^bNoah, a ¹preacher of righteousness, with seven others, when He brought a ^cflood upon the world of the ungodly;

6 and *if* He ^acondemned the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah to destruction by reducing *them* to ashes, having made them an ^bexample to those who would ^clive ungodly *lives* thereafter;

7 and *if* He ^arescued righteous Lot, oppressed by the ^bsensual conduct of ^cunprincipled men

8 (for by what he saw and heard *that* ^arighteous man, while living among them, felt *his* righteous soul tormented day after day by *their* lawless deeds),

9 ^athen the Lord knows how to rescue the godly from ¹temptation, and to keep the unrighteous under punishment for the ^bday of judgment,

10 and especially those who ^{1a}indulge the flesh in *its* corrupt desires and ^bdespise authority.

Daring, ^cself-willed, they do not tremble when they ^brevile angelic ²majesties,

11 ^awhereas angels who are greater in might and power do not bring a reviling judgment against them before the Lord.

12 But ^athese, like unreasoning animals, ^bborn as creatures of instinct to be captured and killed, reviling where they have no knowledge, will in ¹the destruction of those creatures also be destroyed,

13 suffering wrong as ^athe wages of doing wrong. They count it a pleasure to ^brevel in the ^cdaytime. They are stains and blemishes, ^breveling in their ¹deceptions, as they ^dcarouse with you,

14 having eyes full of adultery that never cease from sin, ^aenticing ^bunstable souls, having a heart trained in ^cgreed, ^daccursed children;

15 forsaking ^athe right way, they have gone astray, having followed ^bthe way of Balaam, the *son* of Beor, who loved ^cthe wages of unrighteousness;

16 but he received a rebuke for his own transgression, ^afor a mute donkey, speaking with a voice of a man, restrained the madness of the prophet.

17 These are ^asprings without water and mists driven by a storm, ^bfor whom the ^lblack darkness has been reserved.

18 For speaking out ^aarrogant words of ^bvanity they ^centice by fleshly desires, by ^dsensuality, those who barely ^eescape from the ones who live in error,

19 promising them freedom while they themselves are slaves of corruption; for ^aby what a man is overcome, by this he is enslaved.

20 For if, after they have ^aescaped the defilements of the world by ^bthe knowledge of the ^cLord and Savior Jesus Christ, they are again ^dentangled in them and are overcome, ^ethe last state has become worse for them than the first.

21 ^aFor it would be better for them not to have known the way of righteousness, than having known it, to turn away from ^bthe holy commandment ^chanded on to them.

22 ^lIt has happened to them according to the true proverb, ^a“A DOG RETURNS TO ITS OWN VOMIT,” and, “A sow, after washing, returns to wallowing in the mire.”

Chapter 3 Theme _____

3 This is now, ^abeloved, the second letter I am writing to you in which I am ^bstirring up your sincere mind by way of reminder,

2 that you should ^aremember the words spoken beforehand by ^bthe holy prophets and ^cthe commandment of the Lord and Savior *spoken* by your apostles.

3 ^aKnow this first of all, that ^bin the last days ^cmockers will come with *their* mocking, ^dfollowing after their own lusts,

4 and saying, ^a“Where is the promise of His ^bcoming? For *ever* since the fathers ^cfell asleep, all continues just as it was ^dfrom the beginning of creation.”

5 For ^lwhen they maintain this, it escapes their notice that ^aby the word of God *the* heavens existed long ago and *the* earth was ^bformed out of water and by water,

6 through which ^athe world at that time was ^bdestroyed, being flooded with water.

7 But by His word ^athe present heavens and earth are being reserved for ^bfire, kept for ^cthe day of judgment and destruction of ungodly men.

8 But do not let this one *fact* escape your notice, ^abeloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and ^ba thousand years like one day.

9 ^aThe Lord is not slow about His promise, as some count slowness, but ^bis patient toward you, ^cnot wishing for any to perish but for all to come to repentance.

10 But ^athe day of the Lord ^bwill come like a thief, in which ^cthe heavens ^dwill pass away with a roar and the ^eelements will

be destroyed with intense heat, and ^fthe earth and ^lits works will be ²burned up.

11 Since all these things are to be destroyed in this way, what sort of people ought you to be in holy conduct and godliness,
 12 ^alooking for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which ^bthe heavens will be destroyed by burning, and the ^celements will melt with intense heat!

13 But according to His ^apromise we are looking for ^bnew heavens and a new earth, ^cin which righteousness dwells.

14 ^aTherefore, ^bbeloved, since you look for these things, be diligent to be ^cfound by Him in peace, ^dspotless and blameless, 15 and regard the ^apatience of our Lord as salvation; just as also ^bour beloved brother Paul, ^caccording to the wisdom given him, wrote to you,

16 as also in all ^{his} letters, speaking in them of ^athese things, ^bin which are some things hard to understand, which the untaught and ^cunstable distort, as *they do* also ^dthe rest of the Scriptures, to their own destruction.

17 You therefore, ^abeloved, knowing this beforehand, ^bbe on your guard so that you are not carried away by ^cthe error of ^dunprincipled men and ^efall from your own steadfastness,

18 but grow in the grace and ^aknowledge of our ^bLord and Savior Jesus Christ. ^cTo Him *be* the glory, both now and to the day of eternity. Amen.

15 John ^atestified about Him and cried out, saying, "This was He of whom I said, ^bHe who comes after me ¹has a higher rank than I, ^cfor He existed before me."

16 For of His ^afullness ¹we have all received, and ²grace upon grace.

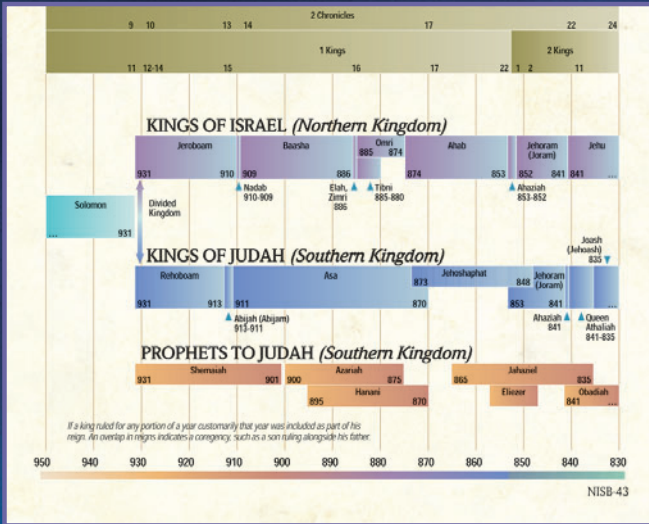
17 For ^athe Law was given through Moses; ^bgrace and ^ctruth ¹were realized through Jesus Christ.
